




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




The fabric colors for the wealthy, royalty, and the Gods. Red, green, and orange are also specifically associated with Lugh.



A gold cloak broach or pin was specifically for the ultra wealthy and royalty. Men wore them on their shoulders. The rune pictured was a symbol of divine influence and magic. It's the "gooseberry" rune, or "iffin".

Brigid's cross (later appropriated as "St Brigid's Cross") was often simplified to  and was heavily associated with the Tuatha de Danann. A symbol for life, life-giving, fertility, and nurturing.
